RESOLUTION #791

Adopting the 2019 Calhoun Area Bicycle and Pedestrian Plan

WHEREAS, amended Title 23 USC 217 (SAFETEA-LU, Section 6001, 2005; MAP-21, 2012; FAST Act, 2015), 23 CFR 450.200 and 450.300, require the State of Alabama and Metropolitan Planning Organizations (MPOs) to accommodate the needs of non-motorists in the transportation planning process as well as integrate walking and bicycling facilities and intermodal programs into transportation plans, and

WHEREAS, USDOT and FHWA directives in June 2009 (FHWA) and March 2010 (USDOT) specifically address requirements to be met by the State and the MPOs in providing said accommodations: "Bicyclists and pedestrians shall be given due consideration in the comprehensive transportation plans developed by each metropolitan planning organization and state." FHWA defines due consideration as "In the planning, design and operation of transportation facilities, bicyclists and pedestrians should be included as a matter of routine...unless exceptional circumstances exist...and the decision not to accommodate them should be the exceptions rather than the rule," and

WHEREAS, the Calhoun Area MPO wishes to update its existing 2012 Bicycle and Pedestrian Plan for the Calhoun County Urbanized Area, and

WHEREAS, the Calhoun County Bicycle/Pedestrian Advisory Committee and MPO staff have developed a Draft 2019 Calhoun Area Bicycle and Pedestrian Plan, and offered it for public review and comment from February 7, 2019 to March 7, 2019 with a public meeting held February 21, 2019, and

WHEREAS, the 2019 Calhoun Area Bicycle and Pedestrian Plan will complement and complete the Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) adopted by the Calhoun Area MPO, now

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Calhoun County MPO hereby adopts the 2019 Calhoun Area Bicycle and Pedestrian Plan. Passed and adopted this 15th day of August 2019.

PLAN SUMMARY

This Calhoun Area MPO Bicycle and Pedestrian Plan Update has been prepared to improve multimodal transportation options for residents of the Calhoun MPO area, in compliance with USDOT and Federal Highway Administration requirements to address bicycle and pedestrian travel in the regional transportation plan. This plan update identifies and prioritizes bicycle and pedestrian facilities for the Calhoun MPO Area, focusing on three types of facilities:

- Share the Road Routes, which provide signage and pavement markings to designate routes and improve motorist awareness of the presence of bicycles in mixed traffic;
- Bicycle Lanes, which provide a striped four-foot wide lane for bicyclists adjacent to the shoulder or curb as well as signage and pavement markings to designate the bicycle lane;
- Multi-use paths, which are paved trails for use by cyclists and pedestrians that are eight feet
 or greater in width that are physically separate from roadways, typically along railroads,
 creeks or rivers, utility easements, or adjacent to a roadway but separated from vehicle
 travel lanes.

The Chief Ladiga Trail (CLT) is an excellent example of a multi-use path, specifically a Rail Trail. Greenway Trails are multi-use paths in natural areas or utility easements. Multi-use paths along roadways are called Side Paths, and typically are wide sidewalks where bicycles are specifically permitted.

Guiding principles have been to improve connectivity of the community to the CLT, and to build on the economic, health, and recreational benefits that the trail provides. The plan is focused on multi-use paths for pedestrians and bicycles and bike lanes where conditions allow cost-effective implementation of these facilities.

Sidewalks have been incorporated where specific comments were received and other known projects are planned. The plan identifies a few of the many sidewalk needs across the region, but does not attempt to compile a regional sidewalk inventory or comprehensive sidewalk recommendations. Each jurisdiction's ADA Transition Plans provide the best local assessment of sidewalk and other pedestrian accommodations, and local jurisdictions should follow those plans in prioritizing needs outside of the scope of this plan. Some trailheads on the Chief Ladiga Trail (CLT) are identified in the plan; additional trailhead locations are likely to be identified as the CLT is developed.

In the body of this document, proposed projects are mapped by area, and tables are included to provide project details and planning level cost estimates. Each jurisdiction within the MPO area has been carefully evaluated to identify projects that will serve each area effectively. The table below summarizes the distribution of projects across the jurisdictions in the region.

To ensure that implementation of the plan begins as quickly as possible, the list on the following page lists the highest priority projects in each area has been recommended for funding in the 2020-2023 Calhoun Area MPO Transportation Improvement Program (TIP). This is not a prioritized list, and funding may not be available to fund all of the recommended projects with TIP funds; alternate sources of funding should be pursued for those projects that are not funded in the TIP.

Multiple funding sources have been identified for project implementation beyond the 2020-2023 TIP. Funding sources are summarized below.

TIP – many of the construction projects included in the plan will be most appropriately funded in with the Calhoun Area MPO's share of Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) funds.

TIP Resurfacing – Share the Road projects and re-striping projects to provide bike lanes should be incorporated into routine resurfacing schedules, which will reduce the cost of bike facility implementation by reducing contractor mobilization and traffic control costs.

Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP) – This competitive FHWA grant program that can fund bicycle and pedestrian projects, administered statewide by ALDOT, should be pursued for the projects with relatively high construction costs.

Recreational Trails Program (RTP) – This program is administered by ADECA, with a focus on developing recreational trails; urban trail connections are eligible, and proposed connecting trails to the CLT would be good candidates for grant applications.

Safe Routes to School (SRTS) – Administered by ALDOT, this competitive grant program focuses on sidewalk connectivity safety programs for schools.

Federal Transit Administration (FTA) – sidewalk and bicycle improvements that provide improved connectivity to transit are eligible for capital funds through FTA, within close proximity of bus stops.

Corporate Sponsorship – major regional projects can be funded through corporate grants and donations, often for specific recognition of the donor company.



Private Grants – a number of foundations provide grants for active lifestyle programs, health initiatives, and community amenities.

Projects are recommended in all areas of the region. While no projects are identified in Hobson City for this first phase of implementation, the proposed bike lanes from Anniston toward Oxford along Noble Street and on Main Street in Oxford will provide important connectivity to residents of Hobson City to downtown Anniston and Oxford.

The total estimated cost for all projects in the plan is \$5.768 million; by jurisdiction project cost estimates are as follows:

- Jacksonville \$1,135,322
- Weaver \$123,788
- Anniston \$4,070,436
- Hobson City \$54,640
- Oxford \$384,299



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1. Introduction

The plan has been developed in cooperation with the Calhoun Area MPO Bicycle and Pedestrian Advisory Committee (BPAC) and Citizens Advisory Committee (CAC). Comments, suggested changes and other ideas will be collected and compiled and addressed in the final plan.

The maps created for this document have been produced with assistance from the GIS staff at East Alabama Regional Planning and Development Commission, and we are deeply grateful for their assistance. This document is available on line on the MPO website at http://www.earpdc.org/pages/?pageID=27.

2. Public Engagement Activities

Bicycle and Pedestrian Advisory Committee Meetings

The Calhoun Area Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) assembled a Bicycle and Pedestrian Advisory Committee (BPAC) to participate in development of the plan update. JRWA staff met with the BPAC on October 3, 2018 to present a report on existing conditions, demographic characteristics of the area, and best practices for development of bicycle and pedestrian plans and facilities, and to obtain feedback on key issues for the plan.

In October and November, a draft of proposed bicycle and pedestrian facilities was developed, and was presented to the stakeholders group on December 12, 2018. Comments from the December BPAC meeting are incorporated in the proposed projects in this document.

A public meeting was held on February 21 with the BPAC and with the general public to present the proposed plan and receive comments, which will be addressed in the final plan document.





3. VISION AND GOALS

Building community consensus around a future vision for the region's bicycle and pedestrian network is a critical element of creating a plan that can be implemented rapidly. Key to this vision is completion of the Chief Ladiga Trail (CLT) and connectivity to the adjacent cities and communities. Realization of the vision will create vibrant communities with growing local businesses that thrive on the activity generated by trail patrons and tourists.

The region's history is a compelling story of industrialization, early new town planning, and the challenges of social and economic change in the 1960s and 1970s. Elements of this history can and should be highlighted in the development of the trail. Historic tourism opportunities add another element to the bicycle tourism attraction of the region, which will be further enhanced by the extension of the CLT to Anniston.

Based on the discussions with stakeholders and officials during the planning process, the following Vision Statement summarizes the purpose of the bicycle planning process.

The continuing improvement of bicycle and pedestrian facilities in the Calhoun urban area will help reduce auto trips, contribute to improved public health, reduce vehicle emissions, support bicycle tourism and historic tourism initiatives, improve safety for non-motorized travelers, and provide an attractive transportation option to the region's residents.

Goals for this plan update are consistent with the 2012 plan:

- To improve bicycle and pedestrian safety;
- To improve bicycle and pedestrian access;
- To include bicycle and pedestrian needs in the planning and development of the community; and
- To increase local support for bicycle and pedestrian activities.





4. EXISTING CONDITIONS

Existing conditions are documented in Interim Memorandum #1, which is included by reference and is incorporated as Appendix B of this report; a summary is provided here.

Calhoun Area Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO)

The Calhoun Area MPO area is responsible for coordinating all federally-funded surface transportation projects within the urbanized area of Calhoun County. The MPO is staffed by East Alabama Regional Planning and Development Commission (EARPDC). The MPO is comprised of three committees:

- A Policy Committee, which sets policy and prioritizes funding of projects;
- A Technical Advisory Committee, which directs technical studies and plans; and
- A Citizens' Advisory Committee, local citizens with an interest in transportation.

An ad-hoc Bicycle and Pedestrian Advisory Committee (BPAC) is convened as needed to provide input for bicycle and pedestrian planning. A Transit Advisory Board serves the ACTS transit system.

In coordination with ALDOT and Federal Highway Administration (FHWA), the MPO produces:

- the Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP), a 20-plus year plan to guide project selection;
- the Transportation Improvement Program (TIP), a four-year program of improvements in the transportation system;
- the Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP), defines annual planning activities; and.
- the Public Participation Plan (PPP) specifies procedures to ensure full and open public involvement in planning.

Planning Partners, Stakeholder Engagement, and Public Outreach

- Key Stakeholder Groups: Bicycle and Pedestrian Advisory Committee (BPAC), City of Jacksonville Bicycle Advisory Committee (JBAC), Main Street Anniston, Coldwater Mountain venue, Fort McClellan.
- Standing Committees: The MPO Citizens Advisory Committee, Technical Advisory Committee, and Policy Committee;
- ACTS Transit Advisory Board;
- Community Stakeholders: business groups, bicycle organizations, Jacksonville State,
 Gadsden State, K-12 schools, community organizations.

Previous Bicycle/Pedestrian Planning Efforts

The Calhoun MPO area has significant bicycle and pedestrian infrastructure in place, most notably the Chief Ladiga Trail and Coldwater Mountain Bike Trail venues. An active bicycling community is spearheaded by the Northeast Alabama Bicycle Association (NEABA). The City of Anniston has been





at the forefront of efforts to transform the area into the Southeast's preeminent bicycle-friendly community. Localized sidewalk networks exist throughout the MPO area.

Several of the area's 18 bicycle projects and 22 pedestrian projects recommended in the MPO's 2012 BPP have been completed or are underway. The JBAC recently prepared a list of projects and policy recommendations to address bicycle and pedestrian needs within Jacksonville. These planning documents provide an important basis for later implementation efforts. With regard to pedestrian facilities, this study's pedestrian assessments will focus on identifying any particular linkages needed to provide pedestrian connectivity to the area's bicycle facilities and key destinations.

Demographics

Cities in the Calhoun Area MPO have had relatively stable population since 2010, although population estimates suggest a continuing loss of population in Anniston. Combined, the five cities gained 20 percent in population from 2000 to 2010, while the unincorporated part of the MPO area lost six percent.

The population of the study area is 71 percent white, 24 percent black, and five percent other races or persons of more than one race. Persons of Hispanic ethnicity, regardless of race, make up four percent of the population.

Overall, median income has improved from 2010 to 2016. Oxford and Weaver have the highest median household incomes, while Hobson City and Anniston are lowest.

Generally, the densest population in the region is focused within about 2.5 miles of the CLT. Minority population is highest in central Anniston and northeast, as shown in Map 3.

The percentage of persons living below the poverty level is highest in the census tracts adjacent to the CLT. Central Anniston and northwest Jacksonville have the highest percentages of poverty. Households with no vehicles are most prevalent in central Anniston.

This geographic distribution of persons with income and mobility disadvantages suggests that extension of the CLT to Anniston can provide significant mobility benefits for transportation-disadvantaged persons in the region and better connections in all the communities along the trail could provide affordable travel options for those with the greatest need.

Land Use and Development Trends

Large areas of public lands to the east, southeast, southwest and west of the developed core of the region have helped focus development in a relatively linear pattern in Calhoun County. Industrial areas are focused along the I-20 corridor in Oxford and south Anniston, as well as southwest of Anniston. Commercial areas are focused along I-20 and US 78 in Oxford, and along State Route 21 and US 431. Forested hills along East Anniston Bypass (US 431) are largely undeveloped.





Key Origins and Destinations: Largest Employers

Map 9 reveals that six of the region's largest employers are located within five minutes riding distance of the CLT: Federal Mogul Corporation, Jacksonville State University, Calhoun Regional Medical Center, Alabama Power, Tyler Union Waterworks, and Calhoun County School System. Two others – Department of Defense Homeland Security and International Automotive Components -- are within a 15 minute bike ride of the CLT.

Roadway Network

Multi-lane arterial highways with 45 mph speed limits or above, heavy traffic, intense commercial development, and frequent driveway connections are generally undesirable roads for cyclists and, to a lesser degree, pedestrians. For this plan, proposed facilities are focused on collector roads parallel to arterial roads (e.g. Church Avenue in Jacksonville, Noble Street in Anniston). Where existing two-lane streets have wide travel lanes (14 feet or more), moderate speed limits (40 mph or less, preferably 35 mph or lower) and moderate traffic volumes, bike lanes may be created by simply re-striping the existing pavement; many cities now routinely reduce vehicle lane widths to 10 feet to enable installation of bike lanes within the existing street.

Existing Bicycle and Pedestrian Networks and Programs

Existing bicycle routes are limited to the CLT, some connecting spur trails in Jacksonville, and "sharrows" on several streets in Jacksonville. Lateral connectivity to the CLT is an important step toward building a more effective network of bicycle and pedestrian facilities.

The Calhoun Area MPO has adopted a policy to include bicycle and pedestrian accommodations in all new road improvement projects. A new bike share program, VeoRide, was launched in January 2019, with rental bicycles positioned in Jacksonville, Anniston, and Oxford that are accessible using a cell phone application. A bicycle education program targeting 4th grade classes in the schools within the MPO area is a continuing safety program.





5. Proposed Bicycle and Pedestrian Facilities


Bicycle and Pedestrian Facility Types

The types of facilities recommended in this plan are sidewalks, share the road routes for bicycles, bicycle lanes, and multi-use paths.

<u>Sidewalks</u> are familiar facilities along streets. To comply with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA), sidewalks should be a minimum of five feet wide, and should not have surface irregularities that create a lip or bump greater than ¼" high. Grades should be a maximum of five percent or match the grade of the road. Cross slopes should not exceed two percent.

<u>Share the Road Routes</u> are designated with signs and may also include "sharrows" on the pavement. These facilities are used where existing pavement is not wide enough to designate a bike lane.











<u>Bike Lanes</u> also are designated with signs and pavement markings, but also provide extra designated pavement space for cyclists. Measured from the face of a curb, bike lanes should be a minimum of five feet wide. On roads without curb, a shoulder bike lane should be a minimum of four feet wide, and may need additional width if the speed limit is above 35 mph.









Multi-use Paths are paved trails eight feet or greater in width that are open to bicyclists, pedestrians, skaters. Where high numbers of pedestrians are expected, multi-use paths are usually 10 to 16 feet wide, depending on expected traffic volume. Where maintenance vehicles (e.g. pickup trucks) will routinely use multi-use path, it is desirable to provide at least 10 feet of pavement to avoid shoulder damage and edge cracking that results from tires dropping off of the pavement.

Generally, multi-use paths are one of three types of facilities:

- Rail Trails are multi-use paths that follow unused railroad rights-of-way.
- Greenway Trails are multi-use paths along creeks or rivers or utility easements.
- Sidepaths are multi-use paths adjacent to streets or highways.

All three types of multi-use path are illustrated below.


As electric bicycles have increased in popularity, many jurisdiction have passed state or local laws prohibiting the highest performance (Class 3) e-bikes from using multi-use paths; lower performance e-bikes generally are permitted on multi-use paths. Calhoun County or the State of Alabama may wish to consider legislation to define and regulate some classes of e-bikes in the future.





Regional Overview

The existing and proposed bicycle and pedestrian facilities in this plan are numbered systematically in the tables and on the maps. Existing facilities are numbered 1 through 10. Proposed facilities are numbered in series, as follows: 100s are Jacksonville area projects; 200s are Weaver and surrounding area; 300s are McClellan area; 400s are LeGarde Park area projects; 500s are central Anniston area projects; 600s are Oxford and Hobson City area projects; and 900s are Vision/Future projects.

The Chief Ladiga Trail provides a regional spine to which other local bicycle and pedestrian facilities should connect. Map 1 shows the full regional network of proposed bicycle and pedestrian facilities. Table 1 lists all of the proposed facilities, along with planning level cost estimates and a proposed implementation priority (High, Mid, Low).

Appendix A contains ledger size version of Map 1 and Table 1 for improved readability and additional detail.

Maps of Proposed Projects

Area maps showing detailed project type and location are provided for each of six areas: Jacksonville; Weaver; McClellan; LeGarde Park; Central Anniston; and Oxford and Hobson City. These maps are numbered 2a through 7a below.

Project Priority Maps

Recommended project phasing priorities for each area are shown in Maps 2b through 7b. These priorities were selected and recommended in order to rapidly implement low cost projects, develop effective connectivity to the Chief Ladiga Trail in the early phase of implementation, provide an equitable regional implementation strategy, and to reflect existing implementation activities and priorities expressed by local officials and at stakeholder meetings. Comments and suggestions from stakeholders regarding these recommended priorities will be addressed in the final plan document.


Project Descriptions and Cost Estimates
















Map 2b -- Jacksonville Area Priorities









Key Issues and Projects in Jacksonville

Projects 111 and 122 are two alternative ways of connecting Church Avenue to Greenleaf Dive. ALDOT strongly prefers to provide a connection at an existing signal at Greenleaf Drive, and are concerned about cyclists attempting to cross Pelham Road (AL 21) at an unsignalized location at White's Gap Road. City officials are concerned with property and drainage issues that may be associated with project 122. It will be important for ALDOT and the City of Jacksonville to determine the best way forward. If drainage and concerns can be resolved, project 122 is recommended.









Map 3a -- Weaver Area Projects


Key Issues and Projects in Anniston

Projects 506 and 507 are critical to establish a connection between Chief Ladiga Trail and Coldwater Mountain trailhead on AL 202. Further engineering study is needed to determine if a multi-use path on the existing bridges is an acceptable solution; adequate total width is available on the bridge deck if ALDOT will consider a reduction in shoulder widths. If a new bridge structure is necessary, the cost of the project will be significantly greater than estimated above.


Project 511 is a "road diet" project, which would eliminate the median left turn lane on Noble Street south of 4th Street in order to provide bicycle lanes.








Map 7a -- Oxford and Hobson City Projects









Map 7b -- Oxford and Hobson City Priorities



Project 609 will provide access to Quintard Mall from downtown Oxford and from the Civic Center. Short segments of multi-use path would be constructed at existing signalized intersections, and the signals upgraded to provide pedestrian signal heads and pedestrian crossing phases.

6. Funding Sources

Sources and options for bicycle and pedestrian facilities and improvements include:

- TIP Projects, either stand-alone bicycle or pedestrian projects or inclusion of bicycle and pedestrian facilities in new road construction or resurfacing/rehabilitation projects;
- ALDOT Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP);
- Recreational Trails Program (RTP);
- Safe Routes to School Program (SRTS);
- Federal Transit Administration (FTA) funds can be used for sidewalk connectivity in limited instances to provide connectivity to bus stops or otherwise enhance transit access (e.g. bike racks on buses or at bus stops);
- Corporate Sponsorship of CLT facilities or segments;
- Private Foundations and grants for active living and healthy communities; and,
- Local funding, which may be General Fund appropriations through the annual city or county budgeting process, or general obligation bonds for large projects.

Table 13 lists the proposed projects in a matrix format with potential funding sources for each. Only the first seven funding sources are included in Table 13. Local funding could be used for any of the listed projects, and the decision to consider this option is left to local staff and officials. All federal grants and most private grants require some local matching funds; typically a minimum of 20 percent match is required for the federal sources listed here.

Wherever possible, bicycle and pedestrian projects should be included with other highway maintenance or construction projects in order to minimize mobilization and traffic control costs. This is particularly important with Share the Road projects, as mobilization and traffic control costs are typically the majority of the expense incurred for these projects.

7. IMPLEMENTATION PLAN

The key to advancing the recommendations in this plan is early and effective implementation. Funding for the top priority projects in this plan should be programmed in the 2020 – 2023 TIP, and a working group should be established to provide oversight on implementation of the projects.

Top Priority Projects for 2020 - 2023 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP)

Top priority projects in each jurisdiction are recommended for funding in the 2020-2023 TIP. These projects have been selected to ensure early implementation of the plan will have substantial benefits in all areas of the MPO region. The projects recommended for funding in the TIP are listed in Table 14 below.

Implementation Oversight Group

To ensure ongoing monitoring and response to any issues that arise during implementation of the TIP projects, an implementation oversight group should be created by the Calhoun Area MPO. This working group should include representatives from the Transportation Advisory Committee, Citizen's Advisory Committee, as well as a representative from Northeast Alabama Bicycle Association (NEABA).

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APPENDIX D TRAIL ECONOMIC IMPACTS IN CALHOUN COUNTY

As a new and added component to the Calhoun MPO Bicycle Pedestrian Plan, recently updated substantially, is the inclusion of measuring the value of economic impact to the development and sustainability of non-motorized street transportation, recreational trail uses and the connectivity to ecotourism, and the overall economic development environment and quality of life. A program along with a methodology to measure this component has been well planned and well outlined to guide and support decisions for public and private sector investment.

Beginning in March 2021, Jacksonville State University's Center for Economic Development and Business Research (CEDBR) in collaboration with JSU's School of Science Masters GIS Program, will begin a new evaluation of the economic impact that the recreational bike/ped trails in Calhoun County have on our local economy. JSU's CEDBR has had trail counters on the Chief Ladiga Trail and Coldwater Mountain Bike Trail for close to three years. They added trail counters to the most recently developed McClellan Trails in February 2020. These trail counters collect raw usage data throughout the year. By pairing this raw data collected from the trail counters in conjunction with intercept surveys that JSU students will be collecting throughout a seven-month time frame at different points along each trail, they will be able to formulate an accurate economic impact these essential trails hae on Calhoun County and the local region's economy. The data used for this study will be collected from March 2021 through October 2021.

The importance of all-encompassing bicycle and pedestrian plan to include the economics of use, expansion and impact ensures that component becomes and stays a vital and necessary link to a city's and to a region's overall transportation plan.

Results of the above study will subsequently be added to the plan when completed.
